Job Description

Bank tellers or customer service representatives

Customer service representatives in financial institutions handle customers' financial transactions, including cashing cheques, completing money transfers and opening and closing accounts.

As a *customer service representative* in a financial institution you perform the following duties:

- Process customer cash deposits and withdrawals, cheques, transfers, bills and credit card payments, money orders, certified cheques
- Obtain and process information required for the provision of services, such as opening accounts and savings plans and purchasing bonds
- Sell travellers' cheques, foreign currency and money orders
- Inform customers of available banking products and services to address their needs.

Financial sales representatives – Loan Officer/Account Manager

Financial sales representatives: sell basic deposit, investment and loan products and services to individuals and businesses.

You perform some the following duties:

- Open new personal and non-personal accounts, and provide access to automated banking machine, telephone banking and online banking services
- Interview applicants to determine the type of loan they need
- Promote the sale of deposit, investment, credit and loan products and guide clients through the application
- Examine, evaluate, and process credit and loan applications
- Assist clients by proposing solutions to address financial objectives such as business expansion, debt management, investment and other financial goals





Types of Employers

You are employed by banks, trust companies, credit unions, investment firms and similar financial institutions.

Salary

In BC the median annual salary for **bank tellers or customer service representatives** is \$41,337. Your earnings can depend on experience, employer, and location. Increases are based on performance and seniority.

In BC the median annual salary earned by *financial services representatives* in BC is \$58,835. However, if you work on large commercial accounts and have additional responsibilities you can earn more. Commercial loan officers, whose clients are businesses, generally have higher earnings than loan officers who deal with consumer loans, such as residential mortgages.

In addition to a salary, you usually receive benefits such as health and dental insurance, paid vacations, paid sick days, and contributions to pension plans.

Working Hours

To serve customers better, many banks are remaining open in the evenings and on weekends, in addition to regular Monday to Friday business hours. Many bank tellers work part-time or "peak time", which means you work during the busiest hours, such as lunch time and weekend mornings.

Many account managers or loan officers work anywhere from 8 to 12 hours each day. You may be required to work weekend hours.

2. Skills, Education and Experience

Skills

- excellent customer service skills
- strong oral and written communication skills
- work well with others
- detail-oriented and problem solving
- enjoy working with numbers
- able to multi-task
- able to keep customers' financial information confidential

Education and Experience

Bank teller/customer service representative

- Combination of high school diploma and on-the-job training
- Experience working in a fast-paced customer service oriented environment
- Basic computer skills, including accurate data entry and experience handling cash
- A degree in finance (or something similar) and/or the completion of the Investment Funds in Canada course, is an asset

Financial Services Representative

- High school diploma and extensive banking experience is usually required
- A bachelor's degree or college diploma in a related field is preferred
- Completion of a loan or credit training program is usually required
- You are required to be licensed by the appropriate governing organization if you sell regulated financial products and investments

Note: To work in this industry you must be bondable, have basic security clearance, a confidential security clearance, as well as a criminal record check.

In Canada, employers usually expect to receive a resume (curriculum vitae) and a cover letter that identifies the position you are applying for and summarizes your relevant experience.
