INDIGENOUS CONSIDERATIONS

VPL's 2020-2025 Strategic Plan prioritizes Truth and Reconciliation. Stakeholder engagement highlighted the need to bring Indigenous history, languages, cultures, and voices into library spaces and services. Through quarterly reporting, staff will provide ongoing updates on VPL's activities to support Truth and Reconciliation, including progress made on goal 2.1 "Reflect and celebrate Indigenous cultures and history" and goal 3.2 "Enhance understanding and appreciation of Indigenous ways of knowing, being, and doing." VPL's Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation Strategy was approved by the Board in November 2022.

DISCUSSION

The Q2 2023 report is designed to show progress made on the priorities and goals outlined in the 2020-2025 Strategic Plan. Components include quarterly and annual performance measures, strategic initiative progress updates, activities supporting Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation, a spotlight on key library activities, and a sampling of patron appreciation and engagement.

The financial implications of implementing activities outlined in VPL's strategic and operating plans are captured in quarterly financial reporting and in separate project updates to the Board.









After its closure during the COVID-19 pandemic, OAK reopened in Q4 2021 in a smaller location while construction of the new branch is underway.

INDIGENOUS RIGHTS AND RECONCILIATION

Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation Strategy Update

- City of Vancouver UNDRIP action plans reviewed to identify fit with VPL's Strategic Plan and Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation Strategy, and our readiness to implement each one. VPL is participating in Action Group 12: Institutional Representation (1.9) which calls on us to promote meaningful involvement of MST within major arts and culture organizations.
- Musqueam representation is being developed in the relocated West Point Grey branch, starting with a welcome sign in English and handaminam - ?ami ce:p kwatxwilam in the entry. Language students from Musqueam recorded pronunciations to be shared with staff for internal education.


Indigenous History Month Programming

2511 attendees at Indigenous programs in Q2

In June, VPL offered a variety of programming for Indigenous History Month. Explore Indigenous Genealogy was presented in partnership with Library and Archives Canada. We launched a new course called *Toward Reconciliation: Start Your Learning Journey*, designed to support people who are curious about land acknowledgements, Truth and Reconciliation, common terminology, and UNDRIP. Public response has been very positive.

VPL posted a resource list on Instagram featuring VPL programs for teens as well as library videos and resources to help them learn about the histories and cultures of the Musqueam, Squamish, and Tsleil-Waututh Nations. Targeting middle years and teen cohorts, we presented a Virtual Field Trip for school classes in grades 4 – 10 with Elder Gertie Pierre from Shíshálh Nation (Sechelt First Nation). Gertie is an Indian Residential School survivor, and works with the Indian Residential School Survivors' Society. Attendees asked thoughtful questions and there was much gratitude expressed for sharing her story. Early Readers Book Clubs explored Indigenous titles in June: Jo Jo Makoons and Raven Tales. Kids were also offered opportunities to learn how to say a few words in both Skwxwú7mesh Sníchim and həngəminəm.

On June 28, over 50 people gathered in the Montalbano Family Theatre to listen to Indigenous Storyteller in Residence Les George in conversation with his brother Sam George Jr. The two Elders and knowledge keepers from the səlilwətał (Tsleil-Waututh) Nation shared teachings about Indian Residential Schools and emphasized that truth and learning must come before reconciliation. VPL also hosted two Indigenous author events. The first featured Joseph Kakwinokanasum in conversation with writer Dallas Hunt discussing Joseph's debut novel, My Indian Summer. The second event was a sold-out evening presented in partnership with Massy Arts Society, featuring bestselling author Michelle Good in conversation with Tsleil Waututh reporter Andrea Crossan, discussing Michelle's latest book, Truth Telling.



SPOTLIGHT

Branch Gardening Programs



In partnership with Village Vancouver, ten branches offered programs on a wide variety of gardening-related topics. Five of these took place in June, with three more planned for July and two this fall. Patrons learned how to

grow microgreens and make incense, and enjoyed learning about organic gardening and gardening in a changing climate.

A particularly well-received program was the Native Edibles Walk and Talk where Lori Snyder shared her knowledge of edible and medicinal plants, including many found just outside the Fraserview Branch! So far, more than 100 patrons have attended these engaging and practical programs, with many indicating interest in additional programming of this nature at their branch.

Village Vancouver is the partner organization for most of VPL's seed libraries which provide patrons with access to a

variety of seasonal seeds, free of charge. Seed libraries are meant to help address food insecurity in our communities, and have proven very popular system-wide.



Relatable Reads: Disability in Literature

In June, The ConnecTra Society and VPL presented the online program Relatable Reads: Disability in Literature to community members living with disabilities. Hosted by staff from Accessible Services and Programming and Learning, this program explored a wide range of titles, available in a variety of accessible formats, that highlight the experiences and perspectives of individuals with disabilities. Staff selected and shared titles from the collection featuring a character with disabilities or written by an author with a disability, including titles by Festival of Literary Diversity coordinator Amanda Leduc and disability justice pioneer Judith Heumann.

Attendees expressed gratitude for shedding light on underrepresented voices, and were keen to explore these titles after the program. Through the power of inclusive storytelling and its impact on promoting empathy and understanding, the program championed diverse narratives that reflect the richness of the human experience.

The Accessible Services team is planning more partnership programming with The ConnecTra Society to support their important work linking

people living with disabilities to activities, services, resources and opportunities aimed at creating a more inclusive community.

Uplift Asian

Uplift Asian



In April & May, VPL presented the second year of the Uplift Asian series, funded again by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC). Seven popular events featured writers, poets, and filmmakers, including local authors Lindsay Wong (former VPL Writer in Residence), Henry Tsang, and Kevin Chong. The average attendance was 63 people, with a total of 441 attendees. Paid social media ads on VPL's Instagram and Facebook, paid by the IRCC grant, were used to promote the series, reaching over 84,000 people across Vancouver and the Lower Mainland.

Similar to last year, the lineup garnered a lot of press, including radio interviews on CBC's On

the Coast and Early Edition. Six of the seven events were recorded, and are available to the public via our series landing page and YouTube. After a successful second year, Uplift Asian has become a key VPL programming initiative celebrating Asian Heritage Month.

West Point Grey Branch Move



The West Point Grey branch relocated in early July to a brighter, more accessible location one block west. The new location features high contrast signage, window seating, and an accessible public computer desk. The branch has a new programming room, providing additional flexible studying/program/child play space previously missing. Patrons have expressed how much they appreciate the changes, particularly the modern look and atmosphere.

We worked with the Musqueam Nation to develop a welcome sign in həndəminəm in the front entrance. We also plan to engage a Musqueam artist to develop a graphic design for the front window. These elements will recognize and honour the land that the West Point Grey branch is located on.


