1. What Would I Do?

Animal health and veterinary technologists and technicians provide technical support to veterinarians by caring for animals and assisting in the diagnosis and treatment of animal health disorders.

Duties may include:

- provide nursing care and rehabilitation therapy for animals
- handle, restrain and care for animals undergoing treatment and surgery

- produce radiographs, collect samples and perform other laboratory tests to assist in diagnosis of animal health problems
- assist veterinarian with animals before, during and following surgery
- prepare surgical equipment, give and monitor anesthetics, and clean up after surgery
- prepare and give medications and vaccines under direction of veterinarian
- provide wound and bandage care
- do specialized procedures such as animal identification and hoof trimming
- talk to clients about animal health care including nutrition and home care
- do laboratory research
- do routine animal dental procedures, and help veterinarians with animal dentistry
- May do office management and clerical duties

2. Am I Suited For This Job?

Animal Health Technologists & Veterinary Technologists & Technicians should be:

- able to follow direction and conduct medical tests
- detail oriented and understanding of the importance of following procedures
- patient and compassionate
- you should have a love of animals
- have good computer skills

Animal Health Technologists & Veterinary Technologists & Technicians work indoors in veterinary clinics, which are often noisy. Emergency call-out work may sometimes be required.

Stress is often associated with treating abused animals or putting down animals. The work can also be physically demanding since you have to lift, hold or restrain animals, risking bites or scratches.

3. What Are The Wages And Benefits?

WorkBC reports that the *median* annual salary for Animal Health Technologists & Veterinary Technicians in BC is \$38,271 with a median hourly wage of \$18.35.



4. What Is The Job Outlook In BC?

There is high demand for animal health technologists and veterinary technicians in BC. Spending on veterinary services has doubled over the last 10 years due to the increasing number of pets in North America. Also, pet owners consider their pets to be a member of the family and are more willing to spend money for involved veterinary procedures to extend the life of their animals. Many new job openings will also come from the need to replace those who retire.

Recent outbreaks of diseases in farm animals are also increasing the demand for veterinary diagnostic services and the services of animal health and veterinary technologists and technicians

5. How do I Become a Veterinary Technician &

Animal Health Technologist?

Education:

Completion of a two- or three-year veterinary or animal health technology diploma or a related program is required.

Registration / Certification:

Although registration as a Registered Veterinary Technologist is voluntary, it is often required by employers.

In B.C. registration as a Registered Veterinary Technologist (RVT) is provided by the *BC Veterinary Technologists Association (BCVTA*) (<u>https://www.bcvta.com/</u>). Registration is available to animal health technologists and veterinary technologists/technicians who have completed an accredited training program and passed the Veterinary Technician National Examination (VTNE).

Click on "Start Search" beside Canadian Businesses, then select the "Advanced Search" button. Select both "Keyword/SIC/NAICS" under Business Type and "City" under Geography. In the top search box enter "veterinary" and click SEARCH. Select the appropriate headings. Lower down, select the Province, choose the cities, and click the "View Results" button.

NOTE: You can access this database from a Library computer. If you are using a computer from outside the Library, you will need a Vancouver Public Library card to login to this database. After clicking on the database name, you will be asked to enter your library card number and PIN (usually last four digits of your telephone number).

Networking, Volunteering and Temporary Agencies

Many positions are filled by people who have been recommended by someone they know. Networking, working as a volunteer or registering with a temporary employment agency are good ways of helping you find jobs and meet people in your industry.

Networking and the Hidden Job Market:

When looking for work, be sure to talk to friends, relatives and neighbours. They may know someone who is hiring! Working as a volunteer, attending events, and joining clubs and associations are good ways to gain "Canadian experience." They are also good ways to meet people to learn about the local job market.
