### **SUMMARY**

### **POLICY**

The Vancouver Public Library's Strategic Plan is a policy that is developed and approved by the Board.

### **INDIGENOUS CONSIDERATIONS**

VPL's 2020-2025 Strategic Plan prioritizes Truth and Reconciliation. Stakeholder engagement highlighted the need to bring Indigenous history, languages, cultures, and voices into library spaces and services. Through quarterly reporting, staff will provide ongoing updates on VPL's activities to support Truth and Reconciliation, including progress made on goal 2.1 "Reflect and celebrate Indigenous cultures and history" and goal 3.2 "Enhance understanding and appreciation of Indigenous ways of knowing, being, and doing."

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### **DISCUSSION**

The Q1 2024 report is designed to show progress made on the priorities and goals outlined in the 2020-2025 Strategic Plan. Components include updated quarterly and annual performance measures, strategic initiative progress updates, activities supporting Indigenous Rights and Reconciliation, a spotlight on key library activities, and a sampling of patron appreciation and engagement.

### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS**

The financial implications of implementing activities outlined in VPL's strategic and operating plans are captured in quarterly financial reporting and in separate project updates to the Board.


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




# **QUARTERLY PERFORMANCE MEASURES**

### INDIGENOUS RIGHTS AND RECONCILIATION

On February 10th, VPL joined the City's UNDRIP Action Group 2, "Urban Indigenous Engagement" at the Friendship Centre for another in person event with members of the Urban Indigenous Community. The feedback from the engagements (two were also held in fall 2023) will be compiled and shared with the Urban Indigenous Community at a summit on April 27.

On March 1st, Maryn Ashdown and Rick Ouellet from VPL along with representatives from Parks, CoV, and the developers of the Oakridge site met with Musqueam Elder Larry Grant to gain further understanding of the significance of obtaining a name. Musqueam wants to be confident that we understand this as part of our ongoing relationship and that we take the obligation to hold the name seriously.

On February 14th, members of the VPL community participated in the annual Woman's Memorial March. History and protocols for the event were posted on the staff intranet site.

In February VPL welcomed Joseph Kakwinokanasum as the 2024 Indigenous Storyteller in Residence. Joseph is a writer, creator, and storyteller from the James Smith Cree Nation who grew up in the Peace Region of northern BC and now lives and works on the unceded territory of the Sooke Nation on Vancouver Island.

Joseph is a graduate of SFU's The Writer's Studio and The Writer's Studio Graduate Workshop. He was selected by Darrel J. McLeod as one of the Writers Trust of Canada's Rising Stars of 2022. His short story Ray Says, was a finalist for CBC's Nonfiction Prize in 2020 and his manuscript Woodland Creetures was awarded the 2014 Canada Council for the Arts Creation Grant for Aboriginal Peoples, Writers, and Storytellers.

His debut novel, My Indian Summer, loosely based on his own childhood was winner of the 2023-2024 First Nations Communities READ Award and shortlisted for the 2023 ReLitAward for fiction. His work has been published in the Humber Literary Journal, the anthology Resonance: Essays on the Craft and life of Writing, Emerge; The Writer's Studio anthology, and Better Next Year: An Anthology of Christmas Epiphanies. Joseph was selected as the 2024 Writer's Trust fiction mentor.

# Beyond the Cover



Beyond the Cover: An Exploration of Disability in Literature is a program for book lovers that sheds light on the often overlooked area of disability representation. Developed through the Accessible Services Department in collaboration with community partner ConnecTra, Beyond the Cover invited participants to examine shifting depictions of disability by discussing a variety of titles and authors. Through four genrespecific sessions, participants explored a diverse range of literature, investigating topics from assistive technology in Science Fiction to Non-Fiction books on activism and social change.

Participants in this program come from all walks of life; many bring a wealth of lived experience with disability which enriches the conversations with personal insights and perspectives. By bridging literature and personal experience, Beyond the Cover not only promotes literacy but also fosters connections and understanding. Reading lists that highlight disability representation developed for the program are now available to all VPL patrons, encouraging everyone to read and explore diverse characters and worldviews.

The program ran from January to April, and was

offered over Zoom with closed captioning and an invitation to participants to share accessibility needs.

# Children and Teen Services Cross-Training with Science World

VPL's Children and Teen Services (CTS) and Science World expanded on a long-standing partnership to conduct cross-training. VPL provided Science World with a series of short how-to video modules on Sharing Songs and Stories with a Group. Science World provided VPL with an hour-long session on Facilitating STEM Programs and Services for Families. We will meet in 2025 to determine the effectiveness of the training for staff and volunteers. Staff at both organizations reported the training was very helpful given the increasing intersection of our services as VPL expands STEM offerings and Science World explores Storytelling programs. In collaboration with Circulation, CTS also provided Science World a Child Care Centre Card which enables them to borrow our Storytime Kits for their programs.



### K-pop Social for Teens

During the February Pro-D day, Teen Services leaned into the community connection that K-pop brings out in its fans by hosting a K-pop Social for Teens at Champlain branch. This event drew 18 teens from across the city, including many who hadn't previously attended a library program. The main attractions were photo card decorating and bias bracelets, while a book corner, snack stations and a K-pop video mix from YouTube completed the vibe.

Offering a DIY photo-card activity removes the financial barriers that photo card collecting can impose, and it embraces the spirit of fandoms. Teens decorated cards for themselves and their friends. Participants said that the experience of being in a shared and safe space making things together was so awesome!

When the program ended, many teens shared their gratitude and how much fun they had. They wished it was longer, they wanted to know when we'd be doing

this again and how they can learn more about VPL programs.

# Family Day Pop-Up Event

A Public Relations Partnership with Family Services of Greater Vancouver 2024



To help build stronger, more resilient communities, VPL partnered with Family Services of Greater Vancouver (FSGV) to host a Family Day Pop-Up Event on February 17 in the Central Library promenade.

The event provided opportunities for attendees to learn about VPL and FSGV programs and services.

FSGV financial coaches and

resource workers provided information to help families improve their financial stability, navigate government benefits, and connect with community supports to address a range of challenges.

VPL staff highlighted the many free services available at the library for Vancouver families, especially those facing financial hardship, such as financial planning workshops, family programs, diverse collections and other resources. There were also coloring activities for children and a wish tree installation where attendees shared hopes and dreams for their families.

Working with Gather Public Relations and FSGV, the event received significant media coverage, including broadcast segments on CBC, Global BC, and Fairchild and numerous online articles that garnered more than 38 million impressions.


# PATRON FEEDBACK, STORIES, AND DIGITAL ENGAGEMENT
