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1. Working as an Architectural Technologist & Technician [NOC 2021: 22210/NOC 2016: 2251]

Job Description

Architectural technologists and technicians help professional architects design, carry out and supervise building projects. You do the following:

- Help in the development of architectural designs
- Analyze building codes, bylaws, space requirements, site requirements and other technical documents and reports
- Prepare manual and CAD (computer-assisted design) drawings, specifications, cost estimates and listings of quantities of material from conceptual drawings and instructions
- Build architectural, display, and 3-D virtual models of architectural designs
- Prepare contract and bidding documents

Industry Overview


As major projects peak and then wind down (e.g. public transportation, pipeline infrastructure), coupled with slower population growth, construction employment is expected to recede between 2022 and 2024, but remain above 2018 levels.

A return to more modest growth over the latter half of the coming decade and the anticipated retirement of 44,200 workers will require the construction and maintenance industry to remain focused on recruiting and training across the entire 2019–2028 scenario period. This demand may be partially met by an estimated 36,500 new entrants aged 30 and younger available locally, but a significant portion of the remainder will likely need to be drawn from outside the province.

In BC the average annual **median** salary is \$62,714. Your wage depends on experience, location, and level of education.

Full-time techs usually get benefits as well as a salary. These can include dental coverage, paid vacations, and paid sick days.

2. Skills, Education and Experience

Skills

- Math and computer skills
- Written and verbal communication
- Drawing and 3-D visualization
- Detail oriented
- Team project work
- Problem solving

Education and Experience

To work as an architectural tech, you usually require:

- Completion of a college program in architectural technology or a related subject
- Certification with the Architectural Institute of British Columbia (AIBC)
 (http://aibc.ca/) and/or Applied Science Technologists & Technicians of British Columbia (ASTTBC) (https://asttbc.org/) may be required
- A period of supervised work experience, usually two years, is required before certification

Qualifications

You must be registered with the Architectural Institute of British Columbia (AIBC) to use the term *Architectural Technologist*.

Certification as a *Certified Residential Designer* or *Registered Building Designer* is available through the *Applied Science Technologists* & *Technicians of BC (ASTTBC)*.

Click on "Start Search" beside Canadian Businesses, then select the "Advanced Search" button. Select both "Keyword/SIC/NAICS" under Business Type and "City" under Geography. In the top search box enter "architect" and click LOOKUP. Select the appropriate headings, e.g. "architectural designers" "architectural services". You can also try "construction companies". Lower down, select the Province, choose the cities, and click the "View Results" button. Available from the VPL Digital Library | Explore our Digital Library page

NOTE: You can access this database from a Library computer. If you are using a computer from outside the Library, you will need a Vancouver Public Library card to login to this database. After clicking on the database name, you will be asked to enter your library card number and PIN (usually last four digits of your telephone number).

4. Applying for a Job

In Canada, employers usually expect to receive a resume or curriculum vitae and a cover letter that identifies the position you are applying for and summarizes your relevant experience.
