## 1. Working as a Management Consultant [NOC 2021: 11201/ NOC 2016: 1122]

#### Job Description

Management consultants perform some or all of the following duties:

- Work with companies to develop or change an organization plan in areas such as operations, human resources, records management, and communications
- Determine efficiency and effectiveness of managerial policies and programs
- Conduct quality audits and develop quality management and quality standards for ISO (International Organization for Standardization) registration
- Study company reports, financial statements, and industry publications

#### **Industry Overview**

Industry experts predict an increased demand for Management Consultants. Recent trends show that large companies and governments prefer to hire management consultants to provide analytical and advisory services, replacing other middle management staff. Professional work experience is critical.

Almost three-quarters of management consultants work in the Lower Mainland.



#### Types of Employers

Management consultants are employed by management consulting firms, large companies, and government agencies. Many are self-employed. Generally, management consultants work for a variety of clients.

#### Salary

The median annual salary for Management Consultants in BC is \$75,207. Those with advance experience and education such as an MBA (Master of Business Administration) can earn more.

#### Working Hours

Management consultants usually work long hours, around 50 to 60 hours a week. Weekend work is common. The extra long hours are expected, and in fact often necessary,

## 2. Skills, Education and Experience

#### Skills

- Excellent analytical and problem-solving abilities
- Excellent interpersonal skills
- Strong verbal and written communication
- Creative and Goal-oriented
- Strong project management skills
- Strong presentation skills
- Able to work in stressful situation

#### **Education and Experience**

- A bachelor's degree or college diploma in business administration, commerce or a related discipline is usually required
- A graduate degree in business administration may be required
- Some establishments may require management consultants to be certified as a Certified Management Consultant
- Some employers prefer to hire management consultants who have earned voluntary certification through a professional association.

The professional designation of Certified Management Consultant (CMC) is administered by the Canadian Association of Management Consultants.

Click on "Start Search" beside Canadian Businesses, then select the "Advanced Search" button. Select both "Keyword/SIC/NAICS" under Business Type and "City" under Geography. In the top search box enter "Business management consultants" and click SEARCH. Select the appropriate headings. Lower down, select the Province, choose the cities, and click the "View Results" button.

*NOTE:* You can access this database from a Library computer. If you are using a computer from outside the Library, you will need a Vancouver Public Library card to login to this database. After clicking on the database name, you will be asked to enter your library card number and PIN (usually last four digits of your telephone number).

### 4. Applying for a Job

In Canada, employers usually expect to receive a resume (curriculum vitae) and a cover letter that identifies the position you are applying for and summarizes your relevant experience.
